Due to the significant variation of productive settlement practices between metropolitan and rural zones, it was critical for the partners to examine not only urban-centered best practices, but to also carefully consider the fundamental differences of operating in small and/ or rural communities. The development of highly effective models for widespread impact within our unique region was one of the foundational and primary priorities for the LIP project since its inception. As a result of this proactive approach to planning, other regions experiencing similar barriers and challenges sought out our models and have applied these concepts in a wide variety of ways. 
